PLANT CARE INFORMATION

Seep Willow or Batamote

Baccharis salicifolia

DESCRIPTION: Seep Willow is not a true willow, but a shrub in the sunflower family. It grows along streams and washes in our region. Shiny, green leave cover wand-like stems. The shrub can reach a size of 10' tall by as wide. The flowers are insignificant to us; however they attract many butterfly species including the Fatal Metalmark.

RECOMMENDED USE: Use as a screen or background plant, as this species can grow to 8' tall by at least as wide.

CULTURE:



Hardiness: Seep willow is very hardy in our region. Mulch the crown for added protection in colder planting sites. .



Sun tolerance: Full sun to moderate shade is fine for Seep Willow.



Watering and feeding: This species is somewhat drought tolerant, but will look bedraggled if stressed. Regular, deep watering will keep it looking its best. Twice a season with a complete fertilizer is appreciated.



Soil requirements: Best in deeper soil.



Pruning: To control or to remove winter frozen stems.
