PLANT CARE INFORMATION

Black Dalea

Dalea frutescens

DESCRIPTION: A spreading evergreen Chihuahuan Desert shrub to 4 feet tall and 5 feet wide. The silvery-green leaves make a good background for masses of small bright rose-purple flowers in late summer and fall. Plants are open and airy unless heavily pruned. Southern Dogface butterflies lay their eggs upon Black Dalea.

RECOMMENDED USE: A good shrub for transitional and arid xeriscape zones.

CULTURE:

Hardiness: Hardy to at least 15° F.



Sun tolerance: Best in full sun.



Watering and feeding: Drought tolerant, but leaves are sparse under dry

Twice-monthly watering makes the best specimens. Feed sparingly if at all or growth may become rampant.



Soil requirements: Not particular, except very heavy clays that don't drain should

be

avoided.



Pruning: Occasional pruning results in more compact plants with denser foliage. Do not prune after early summer or flowers may be sacrificed.
