PLANT CARE INFORMATION

Golden Prickly Pear

Opuntia aurea

DESCRIPTION: Although referred to commonly as a type of Beavertail Cactus, this prickly pear is more closely related to Great Plains or Grizzly Bear Prickly Pear (*Opuntia erinacea*). It forms small, low clumps with trailing branches. The greenish-blue pads are spineless, but are armed with tiny glochids. Flowers occur in late winter to early spring and are golden yellow (sometimes magenta if of hybrid origin with *O. erinacea*). This species comes from all desert regions from Nevada, California, NW Arizona, and northwestern Mexico.

RECOMMENDED USE: Use in an enhanced desert landscape or xeriscape, or in a patio container.

CULTURE:



Hardiness: Down to 10°F.



Sun tolerance: Can be adapted to full sun, but may do better under very light shade.



Watering and feeding: Once established water once a month in the ground (more often if kept in a container). No feeding is necessary in the ground.



Soil requirements: Does best in sandy, well-drained soils.



Pruning: None necessary.
